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
#### PRESIDENTS REPORT

### CURRENT PROJECTS UPDATE





#### Birth Tree Project (from Linda Reeve)

There was a site visit on Monday 14th April with Gill, Alan, Linda and Dave Gray from Frankston Council. Frankston Council have consented to our club using Montague Park (Kars St) for the Birth Tree Project (BTP).

Stage I (2015 - 2018) will be located at the front left of the Kars St entry. Each year we will plant an Annual Celebration Plant, which will consist of a primary Birth Tree surrounded by a variety of aesthetically pleasing child friendly trees and shrubs. Alan is working on the plant pallet to present to council.

During the site visit we were also offered the opportunity to donate significant assets and influence the ongoing landscape plan for Montague Park. Some of the assets discussed included:

- a large pagola (similar to the Joy St Community Garden) with outdoor kitchen/BBQ facilities
- bike path for learner riders
- HPV practice track
- rejuvenating the sports field

A raft of exciting inclusions were discussed, but agreed that at this point we already had the makings of a comprehensive 5 year plan on top of the BTP. Our committee agreed that the Montague Park Project required a separate committee. Nominations for project lead are requested.

#### FACEBOOK TIPS ... MY TIMELINE vs PAGES vs GROUPS



Are you confused about the difference between your timeline, a page or a group when looking at Facebook? Then here are some tips to help you differentiate:

Timeline is your activity on your account, shown with most recent activity at the top.

Pages are official pages for entities, such as celebrities, brands or businesses and Rotary clubs.

Groups are for small group communication, allows people to come together to organize, express objectives, discuss issues, post photos and share related content. Our group is called 'Pen 2.0 Group' and is maintained as a secret group which means only members see the group, who's in it and what members post.
